<sup>†</sup>Special needs status is determined using a validated instrument for identification of children with special health care needs (CSHCN) as defined by the federal Maternal and Child Health Bureau. The CSHCN Screener asks whether a child currently experiences any health consequences and, if so, whether that specific health consequence is due to a medical, behavioral, or other type of health condition that has lasted or is expected to last 12 months or longer. Non-CSHCN are those children who have not been identified with an ongoing special health need.

<sup>++</sup>Results are only presented for public and private insurance coverage. State-level uninsured rates are too low to yield reliable estimates.

\* N/A Estimates based on sample sizes too small to meet standards for reliability or precision. The relative standard error is greater than or equal to 30% and/or the number of responses is less than 20.
